In order to do this, Matt structured a well-organized program that was comprised of different and entertaining events. These events were designed to show recruits what being a Pike is all about. They were invited to watch Monday night football with the brothers, attend a semiformal steak dinner, barbecue with the brothers, watch a live performance of the fraternity's band, enjoy social events with sororities, and more. "At all of these events, I could see the interest growing in the recruits," said Matt, "and I could see them beginning to understand why they should join our fraternity."

Penn State's new recruitment policies created an interesting challenge to all fraternities on campus. In previous years, the recruitment program was practically a free-for-all. Freshmen would be informed of when recruitment started and ended and then bounce aimlessly from one fraternity party to another. At these parties, the brothers would take down their name at the door, then call them out to the next party or rush event. This year, freshmen weren't allowed at parties for the first two weeks of rush. Instead, fraternities were divided into zones, and during the first week, freshmen would go to whichever zone was scheduled for that day. They would mingle with the brothers and exchange information. This presented a new challenge to Matt and his committee because they had to create and plan events to accommodate the new program.
