
Low Badge this year went to Z Λ 221 Larry Yadon. High Badge this year went to Z Λ 633 Dustin Light.

A Day I Won't Forget.

Most of us shambled into the Oliphant Hall auditorium that bright September morning, trying to appear nonchalant about choices that would affect our college careers and our futures.

My choice led to the smallest frat house at the farthest edge of the main campus. But Sigma Nu was the place that felt most comfortable and welcoming to me, despite a family connection to the Sigma Chi house next door. Perhaps that comfort had something to do with the number of Zeta Lambda brothers who had graduated from one of the two Tulsa high schools I attended. We were a large enough contingent that the house was sometimes called "Sigma Kelley."

But it was more than that. Even an eighteen-year-old could sense that the Zeta Lambda chapter was a place where fraternity and individuality were seen as compatible, highly desirable qualities. This was no cookie cutter factory for look-alike and think-alike conformists. And that was lucky for me.

Our pledge trainer Bob Downing spent more than a little time polishing off some of the rough edges I picked up in the back row of the better dressed street gang dramatically embellished in Francis Ford Coppola's film, The Outsiders. From my pledge father Jim Gustine, I learned the value of discipline, leadership and service. From Gary Allison, Vice Dean of the TU College of Law, I learned the importance of scholarship, loyalty and integrity.

And from Sigma Nu itself, I learned the ever enduring importance of Honor.

Larry served Zeta Lambda as pledge trainer and alumni officer, graduated from the University in 1970, and earned a law degree at the University of Oklahoma in 1974 after brief active duty as a member of the U.S. Army Reserves. He is an emeritus board member of the Parent Child Center of Tulsa, which he served as the first board president. Larry is general counsel of a power marketing agency which delivers wholesale electric power in Oklahoma and the surrounding states. He also mediates and arbitrates labor, employment and construction disputes and serves on the Board of Visitors for the University of Tulsa College of Law Sustainable Energy & Resources Law Program (SERL).

He lives in Tulsa, as do two of his three grown children.

Larry's seventh co-authored book, **One Murder Too Many: Whitey Bulger and the Computer Tycoon** about the notorious May 27, 1981 assassination of multi-millionaire Roger Wheeler at Southern Hills Country Club in Tulsa will be published in late November 2013. After graduating in '94 I moved to St. Louis to go to graduate school, where I finally found something to do with my psychology degree: earn another psychology degree. It was a Ph.D. this time, though, so now I can tell people to call me "Dr. Madigan" and be mildly disappointed when they refuse. The specific flavor of my psychology degree is Industrial-Organizational Psychology, which is essentially taking the methods of psychology and applying them to understanding and predicting human behavior in the workplace. I did stuff completely unrelated to my education and previous work experience, but it was a lot of fun and pretty much what you'd expect of a bunch of 20-something year old people who were given a few million by venture capital investors with more cash than discretion.

The Internet tech bubble eventually burst, though, and we moved down to San Diego for a few years before returning to St. Louis to be closer to family and for me to work in the I-O psychology field. During that time Geralyn and I hand crafted two children, both girls currently ages 9 and 6. I'm currently working for the National Archives, a Federal agency, as a Personnel Psychologist. 
On August 17th, Brother Kelly Mcdonald (Z Λ 601) graduated from the University of New Mexico Physician Assistant program.
